

The Nepal Trail Bridge Sector: Successful transition to a fully locally-led sector-wide approach




Nepal Trail Bridge sector

- 10,000 trail bridges (2023)
- Approx. 1 million people use a trail bridge each day

Impact

- Time saved: 3 hours (2-way journey)
- Increase in school attendance: 20%
- Increase in health center frequentation: 30%
- Nucleus of local governance



Rural access situation in Asia and Pacific

- In 2019, close to 75% of the rural population in Asia and Pacific lived close to 2 km from an all-season road
- Rural access varies significantly, from 23% to above 90%
- By 2030 the rural access index could increase from 75% to 76% by 2030 (very minor improvements)
- By 2030, close to 515 million rural inhabitants projected to be still without rural access in the Asia and Pacific region
- The region will not achieve universal access to all-season roads by 2030
- This confirms the need for targeted rural road investments to improve rural accessibility






Reflections on HOW to improve rural access (consultation of rural transport stakeholders)

- Focus on the most remote and those who need it most
- Stronger focus on <u>first mile access</u>, basic access and motorcycle trails (rather than feeder roads and high-quality infrastructure)
- <u>Invest in systems</u> rather than individual projects (e.g. combine investments in transport and agriculture)
- Create <u>employment and income opportunities</u> by building on labor-based infrastructure construction and promoting women participation
- Ensure it is <u>demand-driven</u>; decentralization of power; stronger voice for the communities
