More using public transport

PUTRAJAYA: More and more Malaysians in the Klang Valley are using public transport — if ridership figures by Keretapi Tanah Melayu Berhad (KTMB) are anything to go by.

Transport Minister Datuk Seri Chan Kong Choy said yesterday that KTMB, which operated three kinds of services — commuter, inter-city and cargo — had recorded a phenomenal growth in all its services.

"In the first nine months of last year, the total number of KTMB commuter riders stood at 22.58 million. In the same period this year, the number had gone up to 25.89 million.

"The government is very

confident that we can hit 33 or 34 million before the end of this year," Chan said before chairing his ministry's post-Cabinet meeting.

KTMB also recorded a robust 17 per cent growth or RM62.9 million in profits for its commuter service. In the same period last year, its profits stood at RM53.9 million.

Its inter-city service recorded 2.8 million riders (against 2.6 million last year) with income generated at RM52.5 million (RM50 million last year).

As for its cargo service, it recorded profits of RM83 million against RM80.5 million last year.

"All this only reflects that more and more Malaysians are using public transport. This is a very good sign for our public transport system."

Chan said the demand for KTMB services was acute, particularly during peak hours.

"It is so high that people sometimes find it very difficult to catch a train. The government has decided to refurbish some of the old coaches. Once refurbishment is completed, we hope to reduce interval of service from 30 minutes during peak hours to 15 minutes."

Chan also said the new line of coaches would feature facilities for the handicapped.

Shahrizat: Cater to the needs of the disabled

PETALING JAYA: Women, Family and Community Development Minister Datuk Seri Shahrizat Abdul Jalil has called for a "barrier-free" environment to cater to the needs of the disabled community.

She said the ministry would

rigorously defend the rights of the disabled.

"The requests for more disabled-friendly public transport facilities should not be taken lightly," she said in a statement. "All authorities involved in

the handling and provision of,

among other things, public transport, recreational parks and buildings must take into account the needs of all members of society, including the disabled.

"It is time that a 'barrier-free' environment be realised for the benefit of the whole of society."

Shahrizat added that the ministry held talks with the Housing and Local Government Ministry in July to discuss the efforts taken to provide access and mobility for the disabled.

She added that a joint working paper between the two ministries was submitted during the national council meeting for local government, chaired by the Prime Minister, on Sept 25.

Making it hard to beat traffic lights

LANGKAWI: Come July next year, chances of you escaping the eyes of the law when you commit traffic offences will be slimmer.

With the implementation of the e-Enforcement system, cameras will be placed at traffic light junctions to record offenders on film.

The moment a motorist beats the lights, the information will be relayed to a control centre.

A summons will then be issued to the motorist after the relevant information has been verified with the database.

Transport Minister Datuk Seri Chan Kong Choy said the e-Enforcement system would increase the chances of arresting traffic offenders by up to 95%.

"Currently the chances of traffic offenders being caught is between 16% and 25% and that too when enforcement is carried out," he said.

"We want to increase the probability of traffic offenders being caught to 95%, on par with developed countries," he said in his speech read out by his deputy Datuk Douglas Uggah Embas.

Douglas opened the 47th annual general meeting of the Malaysia Road Safety Council at a hotel here on behalf of Chan. Chan added that the Road Safety Education curriculum would be incorporated in the Year One Bahasa Malaysia subject beginning April next year.

"We are starting with the first phase of the implementation involving 1,000 primary schools nationwide," he said.

He added that the Transport Ministry through the Road Safety Department was cooperating with the Education Ministry to promote early road safety education in schools.

He said the Government had also approved the setting up of the Malaysia Road Safety Research Institute at a cost of RM50mil early next year.

Uptrend in biodiesel output

KUALA LUMPUR: Malaysian palm oil companies can produce at least one million tonnes of biodiesel next year, said Malaysian Palm Oil Association chairman Datuk Sabri Ahmad.

He added that the target was a conservative one.

"There are now five companies producing

biofuel. The total biofuel production from these companies alone should hit 400,000 tonnes this year," he told reporters after the launch of the two-day International Biofuel & Alternative Energy Conference that began yesterday.

Sabri, who is also Golden Hope Plantations Bhd chief executive officer, said the country's biodiesel production should increase significantly in the coming years thanks in part to the Government's support for the industry and rising global demand for biofuel

and biodiesel as alternative energy sources.

As at Nov 8, the Government had approved 75 biodiesel projects involving 72 companies. The biodiesel facilities, with total investment cost of about RM7bil, will be done in phases over several years.

"We expect to see a few more palm oilbased companies starting their biodiesel operations soon which will further boost the country's production capacity," Sabri said.

Chin said the Government had provided a framework for implementing biofuel in the country under the National Biofuel Policy.

"The three-pronged policy involves the production and use of biofuel for the transportation and industrial sectors, biofuel production for export, and commercialisation of the biofuel technology,' he said.

Asked if global demand for biofuel, especially biodiesel, would continue to rise, he said demand would continue to trend upwards.

"The future of biofuel is strengthened by the European Union Biofuel Directive for its member countries to use 2% of biofuel blend in 2005 and to increase it to 5.75% by 2010

due to environmental concerns," he said. Plantation Industries and Commodities Minister Datuk Peter Chin said investments in the biodiesel facilities for these companies would come from local and foreign investors.

"About RM4.87bil would come from local investors, while the balance of RM2.14bil from foreign ones, in particular from Australia, Singapore, the United States, India, Italy and Japan," he said in his speech read by the
