

Regional Environmental Center (REC)


- "... is an international organisation with a mission to assist in solving environmental problems (...)"
 - The REC is legally based on a Charter signed by 30 countries and the EC
 - Multi-stakeholder international Board
 - **190 staff** (some 30 nationalities)
 - Offices in 17+ countries
 - 100% project based organization
 - over 200 running projects
 - 10 12 million € annual turnover



- •Operates in various regions:
 - •EU Members of Central and Eastern Europe (CEE)
 - •EU Enlargement countries, candidates and potential candidates
 - Eastern Partnership Countries
 - •EU27
 - Operation beyond the REC Country Office Network
- •Sub-regional secretariat for CEE, Turkey and selected Black sea countries

REC Main directions of Work

- REC Strategy 2011-2015 defines the activities of the REC within two main directions for work:
 - Governance for sustainability
 - Green economy
- Within those directions REC performs project activities in a specialised working teams that use the available expertise from all organisational levels of the REC – Topic Areas
- Some of them produce efficient tools for delivering waste management training to local authorities

EWAMS

- Framework programme for expanding waste management services of local authorities;
- Overall goal: Establishment of Sub-Regional Secretariat for Central and Eastern Europe as a part of IPLA Secretariat;
- Objectives: building partnerships, support networking efforts and connecting local authorities in a common global network, supporting waste prevention and recycling as the key components of the new European waste hierarchy



EWAMS activities

- Sub-Regional Secretariat establishment
- National and regional waste management assessment reports
- Establishment of National networks for Waste Management collaboration
- Establishment of Regional network for Waste Management collaboration
- Establishment of web platform for exchanging of information and experience in waste management




LEAP Case Study

- The Local Environmental Action Programme (LEAP) is a participatory process for a regional or local community that leads to concrete environmental investments
- LEAP involves setting environmental priorities and selecting the most appropriate actions for addressing priority environmental issues in the community

- Multi-media environmental education curriculum kit – Green Pack
 - Secondary school teachers and their students
 - Focus on particular aspects of environmental protection and sustainable development
 - 35.000+ teachers 3.500.000+ students - in 18 countries....
- Cross-sectoral approach –
 Sustainable Development Academy
 - A comprehensive (~ 1 month!)
 educational programme on the "three
 pillars" of sustainable development
 initiated by the Italian Government
 - SEE CEE Black Sea Region Kazakhstan • Russia






